Feeding the needy sounded like a good idea to Vivian and me. We'd been talking about doing something like that for a while, so we signed up to help out. Little did we know, we had only a faint idea of what we were in for.

Our assignment was to serve up the cheeseburgers and fixins' that other members prepared earlier in the day. I had actually volunteered us to cook, but Headbeak must have reallocated us somewhere along the way. "Damn!" I complained to myself, "now I gotta drive all the way across town to wherever we're doing this thing."

That was the best drive I've ever taken.

This was not a typical homeless shelter, crowded primarily with hopeless looking men and women, suffering through lives marked by substance abuse and mental illness. Here we found expectant mothers, families, teenagers, young, old, black, white. You name it, they were there. And it wasn't just moms who came through with children, it was dads as well, or maybe even grandparents. Most often, the common denominator was children – infants all the way to teenagers. We found ourselves wondering what could possibly have happened in these people's lives to cause them to be here. They looked just like us.

It turns out that the individuals and families we were serving that day came from "severely domestically challenged" homes. Most were there for a few days or weeks, some for months. All had a real need for food, shelter, safety, and not least of all, compassion. We served up dinner to something like 200 pholks down there, and every one of them seemed truly grateful for the help. Some used words, while some said so with a smile. Still others said so with their eyes. Eyes that have seen more pain in a month than many of us will in a lifetime. But, there it was. It was in those eyes. Just a glimmer, maybe, but it was there.

Hope.

Perhaps a shot at getting on their feet and turning their lives in the right direction. A chance to get away from the drugs that dominated their lives. Or maybe just having a full stomach for the first time in days, perhaps weeks. We could only hope that they saw something in us, in what we were doing down there, that might help in some small way to turn that glimmer into a sparkle.

As we finished up and headed for the door, back to our cars, back to our lives of relative luxury and ease, we all knew one thing for sure: We have it pretty good in our lives, and we gained more from the experience than we gave. These Parrotheads, they're special people. Just ask any one of our new friends. We made about 200 of 'em that afternoon.
